### Holding On to God's Seeds...

"Or what woman having ten silver coins, if she loses one of them, does not light a lamp, sweep the house, and search carefully until she finds it?

<sup>9</sup> When she has found it, she calls together her friends and neighbors, saying, 'Rejoice with me, for I have found the coin that I had lost.'

<sup>10</sup> Just so, I tell you, there is joy in the presence of the angels of God over one sinner who repents."

Luke 15:8-10 NRSV

This month, I wanted to share a revelation that I received during worship this past Sunday. And this revelation brought to mind the parable above, of which Jesus spoke in the Gospel according to Luke. Now, the natural inclination, especially as a preacher, is to focus on the moral of the story, which is the joy that God and the heavenly hosts experience when a sinner repents. This of course, is an incredible image to consider, that our changes of heart and behavior elicit such celebration in heaven. What a joy to know that the state of each of our individual souls rate such importance in the divine realms!

However, my revelation was not based only on this good news, but rather the words of the scripture that preceded it. In verse 8 of Luke, we are told of a woman who loses 1 of 10 coins, which moves her to promptly begin searching and scouring all over to find the single coin she lost. Now, we are not told what kind of coins these are. We do not know if they are bronze, silver, gold...or the value of what one was worth. However, what we do know is this was only 1 coin out of the 10 she possessed. So, I would assert that the response of the woman to the loss of the coin, was directly related to the value she placed upon it. Whether it was worth a little or lot based on societal standards, to her, the value of the coin was immense. It was worth the woman stopping everything she was doing, in order to focus all of her time, attention and effort on finding it

This made me think about how many things warrant such time and attention from us? Certainly, most of us would not scour the house for a coin or even dollar, unless we had no other money. Though I do remember as a child searching under the sofa cushions in hopes of finding some lost change, or jumping for joy about finding a quarter on the street to allow me to go buy some candy from the corner store. Yet, as an adult, I have become blessed enough, or maybe privileged enough, that it takes about \$20 to garner my attention, and probably \$50 to make me go searching for it. Still, someone else might tear up the house for far less. It is all about the value we give to something.

So, fast forward to this past Sunday. We did an illustration during the sermon using some small colored pompoms. These pompoms represented seeds in a parable about the word of God. Surprisingly during the illustration and after it, there were members who made sure no pompom was lost, and we had a few people even ask to take some home. I did not ask anyone why they wanted them, or for what they planned on using them. They may have wanted them for crafts, or simply to keep to remind them of the story. It did not matter to me why they wanted to keep them, because as far as I was concerned, if they were of value to them that was enough for me.

This caused me to think of the old saying "One person's *trash* is another person's *treasurer*", and how many things we value differently today. For instance:

- We know there are people who died for every person to have a right to vote, while some throw away this right they fought so hard for.
- Even today, people are still trying to unfairly manipulate votes in favor of a particular party (gerrymandering), in an attempt nullify the voices of people who need to be heard as if they don't matter.
- A vaccine to fight COVID was developed and is saving people's lives daily. It is provided to all of us in this country free of charge. Yet, some people choose not to receive it for various reasons.
- The decision to wear a mask could save countless people's lives. Yet, some fight for the right not to wear one.
- And as we move into Black History Month, we continue to witness attempts to prevent the teaching of black history in our schools, as if the reality that this nation was built on the blood, sweat and tears of a nation of African Americans is something to overlook.

Something, anything, is a valuable as we make it. Just like the pompoms from the illustration, the seeds in the story, and the word of God are as valuable to us as we choose to see them; let us not take for granted the things God provides. We were able show our illustration because our church is open, when others are not. Going to church is a right and a privilege at the same time, not to be taken for granted. We are alive today, maybe partially because of our good decisions, but definitely due to the grace of God. Every day is a gift and an opportunity. God offers us so much that we never earned, and often don't deserve. How much do we value and nurture what He provides? It should make us want to hold on to our seeds!

#### MISSIONARY IN HER OWN HOMETOWN

Sister Diann Harris is a "missionary in her own hometown". A recent article in the Dayton Daily News highlighted her latest endeavor, which is to raise money for the Leukemia Lymphoma Society. Like most missions, this one was not born overnight but is just the latest in a web woven over the course of several years.

One of Diann's earlier missions was playing a supportive role in Rev. Robert E. Jones' ministry. One day, Rev. Jones visited her asking her to create a box he could wear on his head for a



sermon, "Thinking Outside of the Box." As you might imagine, she was totally surprised, and responded "Say what!!?" But Diann and her now deceased husband Zuri (Harold), created what he needed by combining the box he brought with a hat so that he could wear it without being suffocated. (I don't remember that sermon, and I surely hope there is some video in the archives so I can at least get a glimpse.) The next big challenge was when he asked her to create an eye he could wear as a third eye symbolizing Jean Booker's "visionary third eye." This was a prop he wanted to use at Mrs. Booker's memorial service. Strange as this may seem in writing, I was there; and believe me; it was very effective as only Bob Jones could carry out. Later on, he asked her to create three posters depicting messages for those standing on the corner of Philadelphia and Salem, and other places, protesting the closing of Good Samaritan Hospital.

At times, Rev. Jones and Diann flipped roles, and he supported her missions. For example, she had started her Stone Faith Ministry and a

plant ministry. She had given Rev. Jones a basket of flowers. When he returned the basket to her, she shared that one of her friends had ordered some of the stones for various uses at her church. Liking the idea, Bob got some to use at New Hope, the church he was serving following his retirement from College Hill. Diann was germinating, even then, the possibility of using the stones to generate funds to help others struggling with medical costs. Writing that missionary-web thread illustrating the intermingling of pastor/parishioner, friend/friend acquaintance/acquaintance in mission work, leads us back to her present endeavor.

On January 28, 2022, (Diann and Harold's birthday) Diann had a kickoff for her newest mission, the fundraiser for the Leukemia and Lymphoma Society mentioned in the first paragraph. She is asking participants to use a jar to save change until Thanksgiving Day 2022. All the collected funds will be given to the society.

The richness of Diann's missions cannot be depicted adequately on paper. When we can once again gather, we need to have a Mission luncheon, or other appropriate gathering, where she can share her story of the wonderful spiritual and physical places her mission has taken her to, and the marvelous interrelationships that she has experienced. Let's make that happen!

### **Update from Jose LaMont Jones**

Greetings sisters and brothers of College Hill Community Church! I want to thank you for your prayers

and calls for my return to health after a bout of Covid. Wow! Two years of masks, physical distancing, choosing to not gather in large groups, etc. and still that little bug got me! Just goes to show that our control is limited and it is God's sovereignty that goes beyond any power we think we might have. That said, it was God's will that my case was mild, having been vaccinated and all, and that I recover and get medical clearance, again, to travel.

In Kinshasa, DRC (my place of service), the infections showed a spike but not nearly as high as in the United States. It appears that the strong vaccination campaigns for other infectious diseases and accompanying treatments have



rendered some protection from Covid. The jury is still out on that decision but know that, although the pandemic rages on, it's impact is much less in Africa and, specifically, the Democratic Republic of Congo.

The year 2020 had been a strange year! Apart from the impact of the pandemic which has affected the economy and our ability to move about, the active volcano Mount Nyiragongo erupted in May displacing 400,000 people leaving nearly a hundred-thousand permanently homeless. The PCUSA and the reformed churches in Africa (including the Presbyterian churches) provided emergency relief by providing tarps for "housing" as the rains approach, grants for starting over, etc. Many youth and children have been separated from their families and work is underway to reunite them and deal with the trauma of such separations.

Both water and food insecurities have been exacerbated as lava flows destroyed water distribution systems and covered fertile farmlands. It will take another 50 years for these lands to be restored. Please pray that the humanitarian aid from around the world be efficiently utilized to repair the water supply issues and keep this agricultural area as productive as it can be.

In Kinshasa, on the Eastern side of the country, food and water insecurities has also become an issue. Internal migration, in part due to ongoing conflicts, has led to fragmentation of agricultural land and the need to improve soil quality for the long term. I have been working remotely with the Presbyterian Community of Kinshasa (CPK) to summarize the outcomes of a pilot project on urban gardening and the expansion of the same which will help churches, schools and community organizations to fill in the food distribution gaps and provide livelihoods for the unemployed. You can see the presentation we prepared on the Congo Mission Network YouTube channel.

As you can see, while the pandemic has "shut down" many activities and the ways we used to do things, the needs continue and God continues to call us to be fearless disciples and remain actively engaged, both in our communities and the world. Technology has been a great help but it is still the hands-on, old-fashioned relationship building, prayer, action and giving that is most effective. I'm back on track to travel to the DRC and ask you to keep me, the mission God has for me and our sisters and brothers in Congo in your prayers.

#### Race, Science, and the Church

The "Race, Science, and the Church" Zoom workshop will be held on February 16 and 23 from 12:00 - 1:30 P.M. both days.

Is your church actively discussing race? Or is it hard for your congregation to start such a conversation? Science for the Church, a ministry that seeks to help congregations engage science, has found that considering race through the lens of science enhances conversations both new and ongoing.

Science, like the church, is facing a reckoning as it comes to grips with scientific racism past and present. The human sciences – biology and psychology – are shedding light on what race is and how it impacts us, body and mind. The range of fields connected to medicine are learning the complicated and often ugly relationship between race and health. These are just a few of the ways science can inform and improve the conversation our churches have about race.

We invite the presbyteries, clergy, and other church leaders in the Synod of the Covenant to join Science for the Church virtually over consecutive Wednesdays, beginning February 16 in a program that will introduce the following:

- Race as a social construct, not a biological category of Homo sapiens.
- How the social construct of race does impact both our biology (mind and body) and behavior.
- The impact of racism on health, particularly for persons of color.

Science's troubled history, past and present, around race (e.g., eugenics). Program leaders include the Science for the Church team – Drew Rick-Miller, Edgardo Rosado, and Greg Cootsona – and at least one scientist actively researching one of the above topics. All registrants will receive a bibliography of science-related resources on race (articles, books, videos, podcasts) as well as the opportunity to receive Science for the Church's weekly newsletter.




