From the Desk of the Pastor...

⁷ Now Samuel did not yet know the LORD, and the word of the LORD had not yet been revealed to him. ⁸ The LORD called Samuel again, a third time. And he got up and went to Eli, and said, 'Here I am, for you called me.' Then Eli perceived that the LORD was calling the boy. ⁹ Therefore Eli said to Samuel, 'Go, lie down; and if he calls you, you shall say, "Speak, LORD, for your servant is listening."' So Samuel went and lay down in his place.

¹⁰ Now the LORD came and stood there, calling as before, 'Samuel! Samuel!' And Samuel said, 'Speak, for your servant is listening.' ¹¹ Then the LORD said to Samuel, 'See, I am about to do something in Israel that will make both ears of anyone who hears of it tingle. 1 Samuel 3:7-11

In this story about young Samuel before he became a prophet, we are told of how Samuel confused God's voice with Eli's voice because he was not yet familiar with God. Still, even those who have been walking with the Lord for some time can have this problem. It can be very difficult sometimes to hear God, or distinguish the Lord's voice from other voices in our heads and from those around us.

I remember several years ago I went on a Lenten fast unlike any one I had ever done. This time I went on an all liquid fast. Yes, all liquids! I allowed myself smoothies and protein powder, but otherwise, all liquids. At that time I was fasting to get an answer to a very important question that I knew would change my life, so I was very serious about it. However, the problem that came up was at the end 40 days (46 including Sundays), I still had not received the answer I was praying and fasting for. Therefore, I continued my fast past Lent.

This continuation continued month after month until I ultimately fasted on only liquids for 120 days. Kids do not do this at home! Needless to say, there was a lot less of me by the time the fast was over. And to be honest, I cannot recall if I received the answer right when I ended the fast, or sometime later. But I did receive the answer. However, the reason the answer to my question is not what stands out in my memory, is because of how much the Lord spoke to me and impacted my life in ways I did NOT expect. For the Lord showed me some very important things about my life and myself that I did not realize before because I was always so busy being busy, and rarely made time to just listen for God. That fast really changed my life. Yet, I still have to be reminded to fast regularly to continue to get my mind, body and spirit in line with God.

When you seek the Lord with your whole heart, He will often grant you the desires of your heart. 

MARCH IS DEVEPOPMENTAL DISABILITES AWARENESS MONTH

I was blessed to work with children and adults with developmental disabilities at Stillwater Center for 33 years. The youngest child came to the center when she was three weeks and the oldest adult lived into his eighties. Even though the people that lived there had profound cognitive and physical disabilities, most went to a special school and several went to public schools. I attended graduations, Special Olympics, took a resident to the prom (I even wore a dress and heels for my date), accompanied them to an amusement park where staff lifted a resident who had extreme physical disabilities out of her w/c into the water flume ride. We worked hard to adapt activities that people without disabilities enjoyed into their everyday lives. Every March, a recognition banquet is held where various residents, staff, family members, and volunteers are honored. At one of the banquets, they presented a slide show of Beatitudes for People with Disabilities. I was so inspired I've included the below. I hope you will remember these as you attend school and later at your place of employment.

















BEATITUDES FOR PEOPLE WITH DISABILITIES

BLESSED ARE YOU who take time to listen to defective speech, for you help us to know that if we persevere, we can be understood.

BLESSED ARE YOU that never bids us "to hurry up" and more blessed are you that do not take our tasks from our hands to do them for us, for often we need time rather than help.

BLESSED ARE YOU who walk with us in public places and ignore the stares of strangers, for in your companionship we find havens of compassion.

BLESSED ARE YOU who understand that it is difficult for me to put my thoughts into words.

BLESSED ARE YOU who, with a smile, encourage me to try once more.

BLESSED ARE YOU who forget the disability of my body and see the shape of my soul.

BLESSED ARE YOU who see me as a whole person, unique and complete, and not as and one of God's mistakes.

BLESSED ARE YOU who love me just as I am without wondering what I might have been like.

Living God's Conflict Resolution Plan

Church is family, and families sometimes fight. It's an unfortunate part of the reality of community life. As most of us know in any disagreement, or conflict, there are at least two sides; and the more persons involved, the number of sides grow. Conflict can either divide and weaken or unify and strengthen. The eventual outcome is dependent upon many factors, but primarily upon the attitudes and processes used to resolve the differences. As Christians we should be able to avoid serious conflict, or at the very least to cope with it in ways leading to greater, stronger unity and harmony. But we still are just humans, and do not always act as we should. In fact, while working toward peace and harmony, we sometimes create increased discord. In relation to that and our current conflict, information primarily designed to portray one side of the conflict (the "right" side) already has been relayed by sermons, announcements, an article in the church newsletter, church meetings, and even on the prayer chain. At the same time, the request made by those on the "wrong" side to share information from their perspective(s) was denied. We hope you will continue to read with and open mind and heart, and will enter into the resolution phase of our conflict with positive attitudes.

This article is not to air the various grievances we have, because those will be dealt with in the fact finding and resolution process in which we soon will be involved. No, the purpose of this article is to remind of us that God's word is meant for all of us. It applies equally to the reader as to those who are being read to, to the speaker as to those being spoken to. For example when Jesus says, "You hypocrite, first take the log out of your own eye, and then you will see clearly to take the speck out of your neighbor's eye." Matthew 7:3-5 NRSV, is he not indicating that we each must examine ourselves for our own faults before criticizing others. Is that not similar to the common saying, "When you point one finger of criticism at another, remember that you have three fingers pointing back at yourself."? If that is not enough, does not Jesus tell us to love even our enemies? So if in this conflict you see some people as "troublemakers or dissenters," and thus your enemies; Jesus maintains that viewpoint does not permit you to treat them with disdain or disregard, but requires you to treat them with love.

On more than one occasion, the pastor has emphasized to us that we are called to be a light unto the world. We are supposed to act according to the spirit God has instilled within us. We are not to act according to the world, but according to Him who has made us and saved us. Perhaps in addition to whatever else we have chosen to give up or take on for Lent, we should pray that as we grow closer to God, may we also grow nearer and more consistent with living His word and being that light we are called to be. In doing that, we are certain to emerge from our current strife in greater peace, harmony, and unity of purpose. We have been a church for over 77 years. We have persevered through many problems. We all love God, Jesus, and our Church. We continue to pray for our Pastor and Leadership, Congregation, Presbytery and want what is best for College Hill Community Church, Presbyterian USA.

A MESSAGE FROM THE SOCIAL JUSTICE AND PEACEMAKING MINISTRY

What social justice issue makes you want to do something about it? Members of the Social Justice and Peacemaking Ministry Unit have been struggling with this for years. In theory we may be most effective working on a small number of priority items, which we can act locally about. In practice, however, social injustice has many interrelated manifestations, which may appear locally but are imposed by social and economic decisions made far away. Many result from complex and competing issues that act like the legendary "whack a mole" that if whacked here, only pops up over there. On the other hand if we are spread too thin, nothing gets done.

When charged with picking three issues in 2020, we decided on election issues, health issues and racism issues. However these are not small and manageable, but large and complex. Election issues started with voting rights, concerning the right to vote in theory, barriers to voting in practice and having one's vote counted. But it soon flowed naturally into related areas, to gerrymandering (the manipulation of drawing legislative districts for political gain) and ultimately to the results of these elections, particularly the proposed legislation that restricts voting, allows minorities to enhance their power at the expense of others, require supermajorities to end filibusters, and take actions to limit education concerning America's racial history. Other issues include deregulating owning and carrying weapons, particularly "assault weapons" that shoot many bullets fast and facilitate mass shootings. And the court system, which has also become more politicized, supporting the power of one side or the other, is also a cause for concern.

The second priority was Health Care, a basic need which has long been unequally available in this country. This showed particular importance when the Good Samaritan Hospital, a major source of health care in this area, was closed and demolished. At the same time its owner, Premier Health, began building major health centers in white suburbs where more people had more insurance coverage. College Hill has been exceptionally involved in protesting the closing and demolition, and seeking more health care be provided in the community. A very small number of urgent care offices in a new building seems particularly inadequate. Health care has also involved response to the COVID pandemic, access to vaccinations and the like. It also involves the government responses to the economic harms of the pandemic and the likely effects on the benefits that low income people rely on as the emergency ends.

The third priority is racism. This unjust means of dehumanizing some people for the benefit of others, based on their appearance, culture and place of ancestral origin, is as old as the settling of America itself, and has remained powerful through the periods of enslavement, segregation, redlining and mass incarceration. Issues relating to it include policing, urban education and immigration.

And we continued to do many activities that we have done in the past. We have supported efforts to oppose neighborhood violence, prepare the incarcerated for reentry, support efforts to promote green energy by boycotting fossil fuel investments, and support organizations like the ACLU and Amnesty International. We have filed comments on various proposed government regulations that would harm the poor.

As you can see, it is difficult to focus on just a small number of issues. Injustice operates in part because it is complex. Injustice pits various groups of diversity against each other, and people may belong to more than one. It can be hard for people to work together because of different experiences and different feelings that result. We can be caught up in debating whose injustice was worse. We can be tempted to sell out other groups in exchange for favors. Injustice is often a downward spiral, where its victims act in ways that create stereotypes, so that others blame them for their situation, and do nothing.

Figuring out solutions to complex problems is difficult. People do not always agree on what causes the problem or how to fight against it. Also important are feelings of what is possible, what should be rejected, what must be accommodated, what improvements can be hoped for, and what can be accomplished without us having to sacrifice too much. Our views of what is human nature, what might be the work of the devil, and why we like or don't like people on various sides of an issue, are also a challenge. All movements for justice, such as abolition of slavery, the civil rights movement, and efforts for the rights of women have grappled with these sorts of problems.

How do we choose what to support and act on, and what to leave to someone else, if anyone? Much is a result of immediacy. Much will be about what grabs you emotionally.

Social Justice is important in the Bible, where prophets stood up to unjust kings. You do not love your neighbors by treating them unjustly or allowing others to do so. MLK, James Cone, Liberation theologians and many others have found justice work to be a major part of the calling to follow Jesus.

The Social Justice and Peacemaking ministry unit plans to conduct sessions during the year to learn what social justice issues you care about, and as important, which ones you want to work on and support. Please begin thinking about this now and plan to take part later. We look forward to hearing from you.

As the membership grew, they expanded their efforts to include traditional quilts, afghans, lap robes, tote bags, hats, mittens, scarves, etc. Items are made from donated fabric, filler, yarn and notions. This is made possible by generous donors.

The sleeping bags are donated to local shelters to be distributed to homeless individuals in the Greater Dayton area. Since 2004, the chapter has made more than 850

sleeping bags. Their creations have been shared with several agencies: The Women's Center, YWCA Women's & Children's shelter, St. Vincent



hotel, Dayton VA Hospital, Dayton Children's Medical Center - just to name a few.

Many organizations want ideas on how they can support those in our area. The group begins by saying "need does not necessarily mean homelessness". 
