## MISSIONARY JOSE' LAMONT JONES SPEAKS AT COLLEGE HILL COMMUNITY CHURCH (PCUSA)

On Sunday, September 10, 2023, Jose' LaMont Jones, Mission co-worker in Kinshasa, Democratic Republic of Congo will be the guest speaker at 10:30 AM at College Hill Community Church, PC(USA), at 1547 Philadelphia Dr., Dayton, Ohio. Jose' is a member of College Hill Community Church and served as the Coordinator of the Hispanic Ministry. All are invited to attend on September 10 with a light lunch being served following worship service. Call 937-278-4203 with any questions.

Jose' Jones has been serving at the Presbyterian Community of Kinshasa (CPK) Kinshasa, Democratic Republic of Congo. In a country in which the PC(USA) church partners have a long-standing commitment to transforming lives through education, Brother Jose' will assist in building their capacities in infrastructure, teacher skills and training, administration and community involvement. The Democratic Republic of the Congo (DRC) is a country roughly one-quarter the size of the United States. It is a land that has been ravaged by conflict. The majority of DR Congo's people struggle daily for survival. Despite these circumstances, the church in the DRC continues to witness to the good news of God's word through their multifold ministries. José heard the call to be a bridge-builder while he served in a multi-racial, multi-ethnic context. He has lived out his professional life in underserved communities as a teacher and as someone who has supported broad educational endeavors. Most recently, he has served as the Coordinator of the Hispanic Ministry of the College Hill Community Church in Dayton, Ohio. The call to serve in the Congo has a vital connection for José, who reflects, "Many of the enslaved Africans of the United States came from the Congo. As an African American, the opportunity to engage with the culture and peoples of the "motherland" is exciting. It is an opportunity to learn about a part of my heritage that has not been fully captured in the narrative presented here in the United States."

## Colombia Delegation Visits our Presbytery

Four key leaders of the Presbytery of the North Coast in Colombia—the partner presbytery of our Miami Valley Presbytery—will be in the Dayton area for visits Sept. 8-14. Rev. Cristhian Gómez, Rev. Vilma Yáñez, Elder Gina Zabala, and Elder Belkys Teherán are coming to our area to work with us to strengthen and deepen the now 27-year relationship between our presbyteries. The North Coast Presbytery is where College Hill's sister church, the Presbyterian Church of Cartagena, Colombia, is located.

The delegation's itinerary includes plans to: take part in the Sept. 12 Miami Valley Presbytery meeting at Xenia: United and a presbytery Leadership Council meeting by Zoom on Sept. 14, visit the Dayton International Peace Museum, learn about justice and poverty reduction activities in Dayton and Oxford, and events to share their perspectives on Colombia's current situation and ways the church is making a difference on justice, refugee, and peace issues in Colombia. ## International Peacemaker Comes to Miami Valley

A very special visitor will be in our presbytery later this month under auspices of the Presbyterian Peacemaking Program. Gaia Magdalena Łuczak, a Polish peacemaker who works with forced refugees at the Belarus border, will spend September 28- to October 1 in our presbytery, sharing stories of her ministry in school, university, and church settings in Springfield (Sept. 28), Belle Center (Sept. 29), West Chester and Oxford (Sept. 30), and Dayton (Oct. 1). Hispanic Heritage Month (HHM) takes place September 15 to October 15 every year as a time to recognize and celebrate the many contributions, diverse cultures, and extensive histories of the American Latino community.

Beginning in 1968, Hispanic Heritage Month was originally instituted as “Hispanic Heritage Week” by President Lyndon B. Johnson, but it was later extended to a month in 1988 by President Ronald Reagan. Since then, HHM has been celebrated nationwide through festivals, art shows, conferences, community gatherings, and much more. The month also celebrates the independence days of several Latin American countries, including: Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras, and Nicaragua on September 15th, Mexico on September 16th, and Chile on September 18th. Finally, Dia de la Raza — a decolonized alternative to Columbus Day celebrated by Mexico and Chile — occurs on October 12.

Each year, the federal government designates a theme for National Hispanic Heritage Month. This year’s theme is Building Prosperous and Healthy Communities.

As usual, College Hill’s Hispanic Ministry unit will be working with the Worship and Music unit to include special music and other activities during the five Sundays that encompass Hispanic Heritage Month.

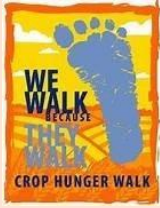

### Hockley (Presbyterians for Disability Concerns)

Do you have a ramp into your church? Do you have accessible bathrooms? Do you have places for people with wheelchairs or walkers to sit in your sanctuary? You do? Great! Being accessible is how we as a church can say "Welcome!" A ramp into your church is a step in the right direction, but it shouldn't end with just a ramp. For many people with a disability, the greatest barrier isn't the stairs they face, but the attitudes of those within the walls of the church. No two people with disabilities are the same and what works for one person may not work for another. The best thing that a faith community can do to help people with disability feel more included in that community is to talk to them. That is the best and easiest accommodation.

Reflect for a moment about attitudes your congregation may have toward people with disabilities. Do we recognize the gifts and talents of people with disabilities and are they fully involved in the life of the congregation? Welcoming another makes room for a relationship that transforms both the one who welcomes and the one who is welcomed. Please remember, you and your faith community need not become experts in disabilities. You just need to practice loving one another.

The main intent of this article is to offer encouragement for those of us who may feel somewhat dismayed at the enormity of the need for loving kindness in the world. And of course, adding to the dismay is the daunting question of how we can personally do anything about it. Hopefully the story below will help to dispel apprehension and stagnation thus spurring action in the right direction—serving God through love and kindness whenever and wherever we can.

I was speaking with a man James Robert who, with his brother, recently closed their business after more than fifty years of operation. Though he has been semi-retired for a while, he now finds himself with far too much time on his hands. All that time has proven to be fertile ground for self-reflection and questioning. “What am I going to do now?” How am I going to make myself useful? How can I make a difference? I’ve had purposes for others since I was about 12 or so. I’m old now and have so many physical challenges, how will I even “see” what you want me to do now God?” Will I want to do what you show me?”

James still has some things to do with the business and continues going to the building which is in a “hood” section of town. There are vagrants, suspicious characters, and even people who have mental health issues hanging around. They may leave trash, use parts of the building to relieve themselves, etc. There are plenty of opportunities for James to have negative responses, but, thankfully, that was only part of his response. Instead, experiencing all of this, a light bulb came on giving James a revelation. **Maybe this was the mission field God was showing him as an answer to all those questions he had been asking.**

He has a friend who has a program for recovering addicts, and he encouraged him to reach out with a message of hope and he would be glad to help. James possesses people-experience- savvy, entrepreneurial spirit, a gift of gab and a winning personality. All of this led him to lessen his criticism and interact positively with those hanging around. He began engaging some of them in conversation, gradually adding words about God and how He could help them change. It’s not easy, not everyone accepts his overtures, and sometimes he questions if it is working.

When I last spoke to him, he stated he has not yet had a victory in the sense that no one has changed. My response to him was that perhaps he has had a victory he hasn't recognized. Perhaps his victory was turning to God, listening for and discerning His response and trusting enough to act on it. And just as he and his brother had a partnership, so do he and God. If he keeps on with his part, God surely will do the rest in His time. That occurrence may not be soon, or even in time for James to see it. He thanked me for the encouragement and affirmed he could see truth in what I said.

**Is James a superhero, or is he just an ordinary Christian following the path God has outlined? You be the judge and decide if James' story can be an example for any of us who are questioning God' purposes for our lives. Perhaps it can have special significance for our church family both as individuals and jointly as we face our ongoing changes. What is God asking you, us, to do?**

## HISTORY OF THE OLDER KID'S MINISTRY, COLLEGE HILL COMMUNITY CHURCH, PCUSA

College Hill Community Church, PCUSA Older Kids Ministry grew out of Good Samaritan Hospital's Exercise Program for Seniors in the Community. It was a fee-based program. When Good Samaritan Hospital no longer had space to operate the program, CHCC provided space in Fellowship Hall. Good Samaritan Hospital provided the staff person. Members of the congregation fee for the exercise program was discounted to \$5.00 per month. When the Good Samaritan Hospital staff, Mrs. Mariann Baldwin, passed away, the arrangement with Good Samaritan Hospital ceased to exist.

Elder Ralph Hopper took over the bi-weekly exercises and began to expand the activities. The name "Older Kids" was chosen and the age 55+. The goal of the Older Kids was to produce wellness and socialization and to keep the members physically active and engaged. Mr. Hopper invited Elder Gladys Turner Finney to co-assist with the planning and coordination of the activities. The first activity was a Valentine' Day Party in Fellowship Hall.

For many years, Elder Hopper was the faithful driver through southwestern Ohio as the Older Kids expanded their knowledge of history during monthly field trips: the Underground Railroad, Levi Coffin House, John Parker House, Harriet Beecher Stowe House; President U.S. Grant Boyhood Home, Governor Taft's Home, Annie Oakley Museum, Paul Laurence Dunbar House, Neil Armstrong Museum, Charles Young Buffalo Soldiers National Monument, etc. There were monthly movies, monthly celebrations of member birthdays, and an annual picnic. Twice a year the Older Kids attended the Summer & "Fall Day at Kirkmont," hosted by the Older Adult Ministry Network of the Presbytery of the Miami Valley.

On January 20, 2009, the Older Kid witnessed the swearing in ceremony of President Barack Obama, the 44th President of the United States in Fellowship Hall. 16 people were present. Around 2014, the Older Kids established a Home Safe Program "call tree" whereby senior members of the church were called and checked on by telephone. Twice a year a Game Night for the Community was held up until COVID-19. Community members became members of the Older Kids Ministry. Many of the women were skilled in crafts, and crocheted and made quilts for nursing home residents. The Older Kids also support other ministries of the church. The Older Kids are a self-sustaining Ministry of College Hill Church who provide \$5.00 per month dues or \$60.00 a year for its budget.
